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# 1. INTRODUCTION

### 1.1 Eastern University, Sri Lanka

The Eastern University, Sri Lanka (EUSL) was started as the Batticaloa University College on the 1<sup>st</sup> of August 1981 in Vantharumoolai with two faculties, namely the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Agriculture, which was affiliated to the University of Peradeniya. It was upgraded to a full-fledged university on 1<sup>st</sup> of October 1986. Currently, the EUSL consists of six faculties, a campus, and an institute: the Faculty of Agriculture, the Faculty of Arts and Culture, the Faculty of Commerce and Management, the Faculty of Health-Care Sciences, the Faculty of Science, the Faculty of Technology, the Trincomalee Campus and the Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies.

# 1.2 Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies

The Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies (SVIAS), Eastern University, Sri Lanka was officially affiliated to the Eastern University, Sri Lanka with effect from 14<sup>th</sup> of March 2005. The institute's history dates back to its existence as a college named Swamy Vipulananda College of Music and Dance (SVCMD). Initially, the college had 75 students and four music teachers. Later, The SVCMD was ceremonially handed over to the Ministry of Higher Education and Information Technology Development by the Ministry of Religious and Cultural Affairs on 20<sup>th</sup> of April 2001. Following this handover, SVCMD was officially affiliated to the EUSL and renamed the Institute as Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies. Students were admitted to the undergraduate study programmes, and the degrees were awarded by the EUSL. The Institute began offering four special degree programmes under three respective departments. The three departments are, Department of Dance, Drama and Theatre Arts, Department of Carnatic Music, and Department of Visual and Technological Arts. The Institute intends to produce graduates equipped with exceptional skills such as subject based knowledge, leadership qualities, soft skills, work in teams. Furthermore, the institute strives to produce graduates with self- employable skills who can maintain peace and harmony through aesthetic studies.

Students who opt for Bharathanatyam as their major practical subject shall choose vocal elective subjects (practical) in their first and second years. Practical and theory are the two components.

The course of study Drama and Theatre as the Branch comes under the Department of Dance, Drama and Theatre Arts. Students completing a course in Drama and Theatre will find it contributes significantly to their personal development. It will also make them aware of the close relationships of theatre to such areas as the humanities, literature, composition, and oral communication. Drama and Theatre enlivens the imagination, challenges creative intellect and at the same time equips students with attitudes and skills necessary for social life and the professional world.

### 2.2 Student Identity Card and Record Book

Every registered student will be given an Identity Card and a Student Record Book. ## 2.3 Postponement of the Programme

The minimum period of the postponement is one year. In special cases, further action will be taken by the Academic Syndicate.

# 3. DEGREE PROGRAMMES

#### 3.1 Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Music

The academic programmes are structured according to the semester system. Each academic year is designated as year 1, 2, 3 and 4, and each year of study is divided into two semesters. One semester consists of 15 weeks of academic work.

The curriculum of all degree programmes offered by the institute is being revised in alignment with the Sri Lankan Qualification Framework (SLQF), respective subject benchmark statements, and other relevant UGC circulars.

The course of study Music (Carnatic Music - Vocal and Instrumental) comes under the Department of Carnatic Music. Students who select Vocal Music as a major practical subject required to choose one elective subject either Veena, Violin or Mirudhangam during their first and second years. In this course of study, Carnatic music students shall select Veena, Violin, and Mirudhangam as the main course unit. If a student selects instrument as their main subject, they are required to select vocal as their elective subject. All other subjects are common.



## 4. EXAMINATION EVALUVATION SYSTEM

#### 4.1 Evaluation

#### 4.1.1 Structure of Assessment

The following two types of assessment will be conducted during the programme.

- 1. Formative Assessment
- 2. Summative Assessment

#### Formative Assessment (FA)

FA processes will be conducted for each course to provide constructive feedback to the students.

#### Summative Assessment (SA)

SA of any component of course of study will be carried out through continuous assessments (conducted during the semester), mid-semester assessment (conducted in the 8<sup>th</sup> week of the semester), and end-semester examination (conducted after the completion of the teaching of the allocated credit hours for the respective semester). SA will be evaluated as follows:

Continuous Assessment 15%Mid Semester Assessment 20%End Semester Examination 65%

SA of any component of any course of study may be conducted in accordance with the appropriate assessment procedures prescribed by the Academic Syndicate. Continuous assessments of a course of study shall be conducted during the academic semester by the convener/lecturer-in-charge of the respective course of study, assigned by the Head of the Department with the approval of Academic Syndicate.

The duration of the continuous assessment shall be decided by the respective Head of the Department based on the course credit units with the approval of Academic Syndicate. The mid-semester assessment shall be conducted in the 8th week of the semester.

No continuous assessment of any course of study shall be repeated if a student is absent on the scheduled date of examination, and the student will be given zero marks. However, it is compulsory for a student to sit for the mid-semester assessment to be eligible for the completion of the respective course of study. The mid-semester assessment shall be repeated for which the absence is due to a valid reason approved by the Head of the Department of Study.

Marks composition for the individual research project work as follows:

Continuous Assessment including proposal presentation - 35%
 Project Report - 50%
 Viva Voce Examination - 15%

Students shall submit the proposed project report certified by the supervisor/s to the Head of the Department of study on or before the final date specified for such submission. The Project report and viva voce examination mentioned above shall be assessed by the examiners and Panel of Examiners appointed by the Academic Syndicate respectively. The continuous assessment shall be assessed by the supervisor, in concurrence with the Head of the department.

The individual/ group performance of fourth year second semester students shall be assessed as follows:

Continuous Performance / Portfolio - 40 % Final Performance - 60 %

## 4.1.3 Overall Grade Point Average (OGPA)

Overall Grade Point Average (herein after referred to as OGPA) for the degree programme shall be calculated at the completion of all requirements for the degree programme as indicated below:

The Overall GPA (OGPA) for all the degree programmes would be in two decimals.

## 4.1.4 Attendance and Repeat Assessment

- I. University regulations require 80% attendance for all courses. If a student does not meet the required attendance, he/she will not be allowed to sit the end-semester examination and will be considered as a repeat candidate. In such case, the student shall be denoted as "NA" for that course.
- II. If a student is absent for the end-semester examination of any course of study without a valid reason, the student shall be denoted "AB" for that course of study and shall be considered a repeat candidate in the subsequent semester for that course.
- III. If a student is absent for the end-semester examination due to medical/ valid reasons must submit a valid medical certificate endorsed by the University Medical Officer or relevant evidence to the office of the Director within two weeks. If the reason is accepted by the Academic Syndicate, then the student's attempt will be retained.
- IV. Any student who obtains a grade lower than C for any course must repeat that course to improve the grade.
- V. Repeat end semester examinations for 4<sup>th</sup> year 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> semesters will be scheduled 45 days after the release of the results.
- VI. End semester examination can be repeated not more than three times and the maximum grade for the repeat examination will be C.

## 4.2 Award of Degree

A student will be awarded the Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Dance, Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Drama and Theatre Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Visual and Technological Arts if he/she has obtained the following requirements within eight academic years:

- a minimum of C grades in all course units of the study programme aggregating
   120 credits, and
- ii. a minimum OGPA of 2.00.

#### 4.2.1 Award of Classes

A student who has fulfilled all the requirements for the award of the Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Dance, Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Drama and Theatre Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours in Visual and Technological Arts within four academic years shall be awarded a class, if he/ she also meets the following additional requirements:

#### First Class

- I. Obtain a minimum OGPA of 3.70;
- II. Obtain A or higher grades in at least 60 credits of which at least 15 credits from the fourth year of study.

## Second Class (Upper Division)

- i. Obtain a minimum OGPA of 3.30
- ii. Obtain A- or higher grades in at least 60 credits of which at least 15 credits from the fourth year of study.

## Second Class (Lower Division)

- i. Obtain a minimum OGPA of 3.00
- ii. Obtain B+ or higher grades in at least 60 credits of which at least 15 credits from the fourth year of study.

## 4.3 Effective Date of the Degree

The effective date of the degree shall be the last date of the particular end semester examination or the last date of Viva-voce examination whichever comes latest shall be considered as the effective date of the degree programme.

# 6. Additional Facilities

# 6.1 Library

The Library of the Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies is located within the premises of the Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies, Eastern University, Sri Lanka. It houses a comprehensive collection specializing in music, dance, drama and theatre and visual arts which constitutes the principal repository of resources in these disciplines for the Institute. The library's holdings are organized into reference and lending collections, which are maintained on two separate floors within the same building.

The Library of the Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies provides information resources in diverse formats, including books, journals, magazines, dictionaries, encyclopedias, directories, newspapers, past papers, undergraduates' research reports, conference proceedings and special collections, etc. The total collection of the Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies library consists of nearly 11,000 books along with a constant number of academic journals and magazines.

### 6.2 Language Learning Zone

The significance of languages is extensively multi dimensional, and its Significance is evident in every aspect and interaction in our daily lives. We use language to inform the people around us about what we feel, what we desire, and question or comprehend the world around us. We communicate effectively through words, gestures, and tone in a multitude situation. The ability to communicate with each other forms bonds and fosters team work. Communication drives our lives and shapes ourselves.

In Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies, we are exposed to different languages, cultures and traditions of people from all over the country. The Language Learning Zone at SVIAS offers languages such as Tamil, English, Sinhala and Sanskrit. These languages support the students both academically and professionally as some of the main theories taught in core subjects are available in these languages. Therefore, incorporating these languages into the zone will be highly beneficial. In addition, SVIAS has decided to include Sinhala as one of the additional languages in the curriculum.

The Language Learning Zone helps the Extramural Studies unit to conduct the following certificate courses: Certificate in English for Creative Communication, and Certificate in Basic Sinhala.

In the contemporary world it is necessary to learn more than one language in order get a job or pursue higher education. Therefore, when the students graduate and look for a job, the languages which she or he has learnt will be an added quality.

As strong communication skills are essential in almost all of the professional careers, the Language Learning Zone helps the students in acquiring these vital skills. The Language Learning Zone provides an opportunity to enhance the students' language competence with practical skills.

# 6.3 Unit of Information and Communication Technology

The Unit of ICT (UICT) of the Swamy Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies was established as an independent unit in 2018. Its main task is to teach IT modules for the students of all four-degree programmes in the institute. The aim of these modules is to enhance students' IT Knowledge and skills essential to carry out their day-to-day activities. The UICT has two fully equipped computer laboratories and a server room to cater the requirements of undergraduates during their practical sessions of various course modules.

#### **6.4 Student Hostels**

Hostel facilities are available for both male and female students. Preference for hostel accommodations is given to the outstation students. Hostel students are provided with facilities such as, beds, mattresses, towel racks, study tables, chairs and water filters. In addition, a television set is available in the common hall. Sub-wardens are responsible for the day-to-day administration of the hostels. Students are advised to contact the sub-warden in all matters related to hostel accommodation. For further information regarding accommodation can contact the Assistant Registrar, Student Welfare.

#### **6.5 Institution Health Centre**

A Health Centre has been established at the institute to provide health care services to staff and students. A visiting doctor is available to provide immediate medical assistance. Medical certificates submitted by the students should be recommended by the visiting doctor.

# **6.6 Physical Education Unit**

Facilities for sports activities are provided by the Institute. The Instructor - in - charge of Physical Education, Sports Council, and Sports Advisory Board are responsible for sports activities. Students are encouraged to make the best use of such opportunities.

#### 6.7 Financial Assistance

The Mahapola Scholarship and the Bursary are the two major sources of financial assistance available to students. Students are required to contact the Assistant Registrar, Student Welfare for further information.

# 7. EXAMINATION RULES AND REGULATIONS

# 7.1 Candidates Attending the Examinations

- 1. Candidates shall be in attendance outside the examination hall at least 15 minutes before the commencement of each paper but shall not enter the halls until they are requested to do so by the supervisor.
- 2. On admission to the hall, a candidate shall occupy the seat allotted to him/ her and shall not change it except on the specific instructions of the supervisor.
- 3. No candidate shall be admitted to the examination hall for any reason whatsoever after the expiry of half an hour from the commencement of the examination. Nor shall a candidate be allowed to leave the hall until half an hour have lapsed from the commencement of the examination or during the last 15 minutes of the paper.
- 4. Candidates shall have their Student Record Book, Student Identity Card and Admission Card with them in the examination hall on every occasion they attend a paper/ an exam. The candidature is liable to be cancelled if a student does not produce the Student Record Book. If a candidate fails to bring his/her record book on any occasion, he/she shall sign a declaration in respect of the paper for which he/she had not produced the record book in the form provided for it, and produce the record book on the next occasion when he/ she appears for the examination. The presentation of the Record Book should be documented on the declaration form. The declaration forms shall be checked by the DR/SAR/AR of the Examinations and Student Admissions before the release of results.

If it is the last paper or the only paper, he/she is sitting, he/ she shall produce the record book to the DR/SAR/AR of the Examinations and Student Admissions on the following day, and get the documentation on the declaration form.

If a candidate loses his/her record book in the course of the examination, he/ she may present his/her Student Identity Card and shall obtain a duplicate record book from the DR/SAR/AR of the Examinations and Student Admissions, for producing at the examination hall.

5. No candidate shall have in his/her possession, (e.g. in the clothes, Admission Card, Time Tables, Record Book or any other object he/she is permitted to bring into the examination hall), any notes, signs and formula or any other unauthorized material. Books, notes, mobile phones etc. which a candidate has brought with parcels, handbags, him/ her should be kept at a place indicated by the Supervisor/Invigilator.

- 6. A candidate may be required by the supervisor to declare any item in his/ her possession or on their person.
- 7. No candidate shall copy or attempt to copy from any book or paper or notes or similar material or from the scripts of another candidate. Nor shall any candidate either help another candidate or obtain help from another candidate or any other person. Nor shall any candidate conduct himself/ herself so negligently that an opportunity is given to any other candidate to read anything written by him or to watch any practical examination performed by him. Nor shall any candidate use any other unfair means or obtain or render improper assistance during the examination.
- 8. No candidate shall submit a practical or field book or dissertation or project study or answer script which has been done wholly or partly by anyone other than the candidate himself/herself.
- 9. Candidate shall bring their own pens, ink, mathematical instruments, erasers, pencils, or any other approved equipment or stationery which they have been instructed to bring.
- 10. Examination stationery (i.e. writing paper, graph paper, drawing paper, ledger paper, précis paper etc.) will be supplied as necessary. No sheet of paper or answer book supplied to a candidate may be torn, crumpled, folded or otherwise mutilated. No paper other than supplied to him/her by the supervisor/ invigilator shall be used by candidates. Log tables or any other material provided shall be used carefully and left behind on the desk. All supplied materials, whether used or unused, shall be left behind on the desk and not removed from the examination halls.
- 11. Every candidate shall enter his/her index number on the answer book and on every continuation paper. He/she shall also enter all necessary particulars as indicated in the cover of the answer book. A candidate who inserts on his / her script and index number other than his/ her own is liable to be considered as having attempted to cheat. A script that bears no index number or an index number which cannot be identified is liable to be rejected. No candidate shall write his/her name or any other identifying mark on the answer script.
- 12. All calculations and rough work shall be done only on paper supplied for the examination and shall be cancelled and attached to the answer script. Such work should not be done on admission cards, timetables, question papers, record books or on any other paper. Any candidate who disregards these instructions risks being considered as having written notes or outline of answers with the intention of copying.

- 13. Any answer or part of an answer which is not to be considered for the purpose of assessment shall be neatly crossed out. If the same question has been answered in more than one place, the answer or answers that are not to be counted shall be neatly crossed out.
- 14. Candidates are under the authority of the supervisor and shall assist by following his/her instructions and those of invigilators during the examination and immediately before and after it.
- 15. Every candidate shall conduct himself/herself in the examination hall and its precincts so as not to cause disturbance or inconvenience to the supervisor or his/her staff or to other candidates. In entering and leaving the hall he /she shall conduct himself / herself as quietly as possible. A candidate is liable to be excluded from the examination hall for disorderly conduct.
- 16. Candidates shall stop work promptly when ordered by the supervisor/ invigilator to do so.
- 17. Absolute silence shall be maintained in the examination hall and its precincts. A candidate is not permitted for any reason whatsoever to communicate or interact with anyone other than the supervisor/ invigilator.
- 18. During the course of answering a paper no candidate shall be permitted to leave the examination hall temporarily. In case of an emergency, the supervisor/invigilator shall grant him/her permission to do so but the candidate will be under his/her surveillance.
- 19. No person shall impersonate a candidate at the examination, nor shall any candidate allow himself/ herself to be so impersonated by another person.
- 20. Serious note will be taken of any dishonest assistance given to a candidate, by any person.
- 21. If circumstances arise that in the opinion of the supervisor render the cancellation or postponement of the examination necessary, he/she shall stop the examination, collect the scripts already written and report the matter as soon as possible to the Director/ DR/SAR/AR of the Examinations and Student Admissions.
- 22. The supervisor/ invigilator is empowered to require any candidate to make a statement in writing on any matter which may have arisen during the course of the examination and such statement shall be signed by the candidate. No candidate shall refuse to make such a statement or to sign it.

- 23. No candidate shall contact any person other than the Vice-Chancellor, Director, Head of the Department or the DR/SAR/AR of the Examinations and Student Admissions regarding any matter concerning the examination.
- 24. Every candidate shall hand over the answer script personally to the supervisor/ invigilator or remain in his/her seat until it is collected. On no account shall a candidate hand over his answer script to the attendant, a minor employee or another candidate.
- 25. Every candidate who registers for an examination shall be deemed to have sat the examination unless he/she withdraws from the examination within the specified period or submits a medical certificate prior to the commencement of the examination. The medical certificate shall be from the University/Institute medical officer. If this is not possible, the medical certificate should be obtained from a Government Medical Practitioner and submitted to the university/Institute medical officer at the earliest possible time.
- 26. No student shall sit an examination, if he/she has exhausted the number of attempts that he/she is allowed to sit that particular examination, unless he/ she has been granted special permission to do so by the Academic Syndicate.

# 7.2 Candidates absenting from the Examinations

- 1. A candidate who has not appeared for an examination or part of it for which he/she is due to sit, should submit an appeal if he/she wishes to preserve the attempt for a future examination. This allowance shall not be considered unless the candidate makes an appeal. The following reasons may be considered:
  - a. Unexpected illness
  - b. Death in immediate family and bereavement;
  - c. Other reasons that may be considered valid by the Academic Syndicate.
- 2. If a candidate is unable to attend an examination or part of it due to illness, he/ she should submit an appeal letter along with a Medical Certificate (MC) issued by the medical officer who has treated him/her to the Director within two weeks of the examination. The Director shall send the MC to the University/Institute Medical Officer for authentication.
- 3. In case a candidate is unable to attend an examination or part of it owing to bereavement due to a death in his/her immediate family he/she should submit an appeal letter along with evidence of such death. Immediate family indicates one's own parents, siblings, spouse or children.
- 4. In case a candidate is unable to attend an examination or part of it due to a valid reason which may be considered, the candidate shall submit an appeal letter accompanied by supporting evidence.
  - Examples: Representing the Institute, University or Country in any event approved by the Director
- 5. Once the evidences are authenticated, the appeal shall be considered by the Academic Syndicate, if found appropriate.
- 6. The academic syndicate shall decide whether the appeal is acceptable and approve or reject the request. The decision shall be informed to the candidate by the DR/ SAR/AR of Examinations and Student Admissions.

#### 7.3 Offences and Punishments

- 1. Any candidate who violates Examination Rule 5 (7.1.5) shall be deemed guilty of the offence of possession of unauthorized documents and shall be liable to the cancellation of his candidature from the examination and any further punishment that the Board of Management may decide upon.
- 2. Any candidate who violates Examination Rule 7 (7.1.7) shall be deemed guilty of copying and shall therefore be liable to cancellation of his candidature from the examination and to be prohibited from sitting any examination of the university for a period of time and to any other punishment that the Board of Management may decide upon
- 3. Any candidate who violates Examination Rule 8 (7.1.8) shall be deemed guilty of the offence of having cheated at the examination and shall be liable to the cancellation of his candidature from the examination and to be prohibited from sitting any examination of the university for a period not less than three years and to any further punishment as determined by the Board of Management.
- 4. Any candidate who is detected removing examination stationery and other material provided for the Examination Rule 10 (7.1.10) shall be deemed guilty of an examination offence and shall be liable for punishment including cancellation and/ or prohibition from sitting any examination of the university for such period as may be specified by the Board of Management.
- 5. Any candidate who violates any one or more of the Examination rules 6 (7.1.6), 14 (7.1.14), 15 (7.1.15), 16 (7.1.16), 17 (7.1.17) or 18 (7.1.18) shall be deemed guilty of the offence of disorderly conduct and shall be liable to punishment including cancellation/ or prohibition from any examination of the university for such period as may be specified by the Board of Management.
- 6. Any candidate who violates Examination Rule 19 (7.1.19) shall be guilty of the offence of impersonation and shall be liable to cancellation of candidature from the examination and to be prohibited from sitting any examination of the university for a period of not less than 5 years and to any further punishment that the Board of Management may decide. He/she may also be liable to any punishment under the Penal Code/ Criminal Law.
- 7. Any candidate who violates Examination Rule 20 (7.1.20) shall be guilty of an examination offence and shall be liable to cancellation of candidature from the examination and to any further punishment that the Board of Management may decide upon.

- 8. Any candidate found aiding and abetting the commission of any of the above examination offences shall be deemed to have committed that offence and shall be liable to the same punishments.
- 9. The punishments mentioned in the section 7.1.3 are the minimum, but may enhanced depending on the gravity of each case.

# 8. STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

The students of the SVIAS are the stakeholders in a higher learning institution that has a mission of preserving and enriching the cultural heritage of the country. The institute aims to produce employable graduates in their chosen fields of aesthetic disciplines.

- 1. Every student is expected to be of a high moral character and good behavior with commitment to achieve excellence in aesthetic disciplines.
- 2. Students shall contribute to the aesthetic discipline and smooth functioning of the institute.
- 3. Every student shall help the institute in preserving all its properties and aesthetic values. Any act of vandalism and disruption of smooth functioning of the academic and other activities of the institute is a punishable offence.
- 4. Students are expected to be neatly groomed and well dressed in line with their cultural and traditional norms.
- 5. No student shall, except with the written permission of the Director/SVIAS participate in Radio/TV/Public programmes, contribute any articles or letters to Newspapers or literatures under the name of SVIAS.
- 6. Ragging in any form is a strictly punishable offence under the law.
- 7. Students should strictly avoid smoking and intoxicating drinks within the Campus.
- 8. A conducive Teacher-Student relationship is expected to be maintained for achieving the goals of SVIAS.
- 9. No student shall seek private tuition from the academic staff of SVIAS.
